## COVID-19 UPDATE: Our Work is Even More Essential

We didn't know what to expect when the global pandemic began to impact our community. We knew from experience that need for our services rises in times of great stress, however, we could not anticipate this level of need. Experts on intimate partner violence estimate the proportion of *physical* abuse has risen 80% over the previous three years. A large hospital in Boston reported that as stay at home orders lifted, victims arrived with broken bones and bruised or punctured organs, injuries that indicated the victims delayed seeking care for fear of infection at a hospital, clinic or shelter - the devil you know (abuse) is better than the devil you don't know (COVID-19).

Thanks to our community partners and donors, we were able to implement policies and procedures to protect our clients and staff from COVID-19 while maintaining vital services throughout this crisis. As a trusted community partner, current and new clients turned to us at a time when some victims across the country and world chose to stay silent and stay home, fearing the virus more than the abuse.

## The Pandemic's Impact Upon a Survivor:

Vivian, a former shelter client, has been struggling significantly during the COVID-19 crisis. We first connected with Vivian in December of 2018. Due to domestic violence, she had been chronically homeless for years in Indiana and Wisconsin. Vivian explained that there were many times when she was on the street and at one particularly low point resorted to eating dirt due to hunger. In March of 2019, we were able to assist with a move into low income housing, where she still resides today.

Since the beginning of the pandemic, she has not been given any hours at her restaurant job, has had zero income, had not received any unemployment, did not receive her stimulus check, did not receive her tax refund and her social security disability is still pending. She also suffered a severe case of shingles during the lock down. Despite all of this, Vivian has been learning to become a great advocate for herself and is determined to persevere.

Vivian called recently to report that she received a response from letters she recently wrote to her state representatives pleading for help in getting the funds to which she is entitled. She received a quick response: her stimulus check was deposited into her bank account; she secured the unemployment to which she has been entitled, back dated to April; and her tax refund. She continues to follow up regularly on her disability status.

Vivian expressed gratitude to Advocates and said that out of all of the shelters and programs she has turned to, Advocates has been by far the most supportive. We were able to offer her a \$100 gift card from United Way of Greater Milwaukee each month throughout the pandemic, assisted her in rent and utility bills until she was able to adjust her rent payment to \$0 due to having no income now, assisted her in obtaining her much needed medications, regularly dropped off donated meals, and provided several taxi vouchers to allow her to get to the food pantry. Without our help, Vivian said she doesn't believe she would have been able to make it through the past several months and believes she would have ended up back on the street.

The conversation brought tears to my eyes so I thought I would share it with you. It's a perfect example of why we're here and do what we do. Imagine what would happen to a woman like Vivian during this pandemic if we were not here? With your help, we will not have to imagine that possibility. —Charlotte Coenen, Community and Housing Advocate
